Notes from the Mayor (there's a lot this month)

The **Wells Fargo Building** will belong to the Village and administration will start looking for renovation funds so the community will be able to use the building efficiently. The **ATM will remain** there.

As **spring** approaches, so does **wildfire season**. Take some time to review or create your family's and animal's **emergency plan**. The fire department has information on **wildfire prevention and preparedness** and emergency plans at https://www.corrales-nm.org/fire/page/wildfire-safety-and-preparation and https://www.corrales-nm.org/animalcontrol/page/animal-evacuation-plan. You can always contact the department at 505-898-7501 with additional questions.

That's why everyone should work on their property to **decrease the flammable load** adjacent to or on your property. Another **cleanup** is planned in the coming weeks for the **Bosque dead and down**. The event is sponsored by the Bosque Advisory Committee. It will take place at the **south end of Andrews Lane** at the **levee** on **Sat., March 16th, 10 AM until 12 PM.** Wear sturdy gloves.

Our **code enforcement** officer, **Sherrie Rice**, is out at the request of the fire chief **checking properties**, offering some **suggestions** about **cleaning up flammable trash**. She is trying to make our homes **safe**. The **fire department** is also on extra shifts on windy days so they can **respond quickly**. Approved bonds were for a fire substation, roads/drainage, and farmland conservation easements/open space. The administration would like to start with

the **fire substation** (\$1 million) and **roads and drainage** (\$1 million) for \$2 million total to be sold this spring. Anthony Martinez, our Fire Chief, and Michael Chavez, our Public Works Director, have projects ready for completion. In **2 years** we could sell the remaining \$2 million, again without affecting the mill levy on our property taxes, for open space that has been identified, but is not ready for purchase at this time. The Administration's interest is on park expansion and green belt with some walking paths and parking area thrown in. This idea is moving forward with help from state MainStreet consultants.

In talking to residents of the Village it has come to my attention that there is confusion about **what a conservation easement is** and whether the Village really buys the land. A **conservation easement is**:

- a voluntary legal agreement with a private landowner where the lands are protected in perpetuity.
- a payment to a property owner to purchase the development rights on the land.
- protects certain conservation values of the property (in this case farmland).
- provides tax benefits to the property owner.
- allows the property owner to maintain ownership and control of the property, including having the option to sell the property in the future.
 Future owners are still barred from building on the property.

The administration would like to **purchase** some **open land** for the community to use, but it is not available at this time. Therefore, we would like to sell the **two \$1 million bonds** for the **fire substation and roads** this spring, with the **\$2 million for open space** sold sometime in **2026**. The focus of the administration is on police protection, fire safety and prevention, sewers, roads, and storm water drainage. **Secondary** to that is providing **benefits** for the community: library, parks, pool, and athletic activities such as the new gym.

Another \$1 million bond will provide **funds for roads** that can be used for matches to grants to **leverage those funds**. Sereno, Reclining Acres, Coronado, and Meadowlark between Corrales Road and Loma Larga are roads slated for work if the funds are obtained. **\$200,000** was set aside for both **roads/drainage** and the **fire substation** (for total of \$400,000) to help deal with our storm water management and fire concerns. More bond funds, **\$1.6 million** will be available for the roads/drainage and fire substation in **2026**.

- Install handrails on both sides of staircases.
