March, the third month of the Gregorian calendar, holds a unique position in the realm of time. Its name, derived from the Latin "Martius," pays homage to Mars, the Roman god of war and agriculture. This association with Mars reflects the significance of the month as a period of transition from the dormancy of winter to the resurgence of spring, and a time when warriors would prepare for military campaigns.

In the earliest Roman calendar, it was the first month of the year, coinciding with the beginning of spring. However, with the introduction of the Julian calendar in 45 BC, January became the first month, and March was repositioned as the third.

Today, March is home to International Women's Day, a celebration of women's achievements and contributions, and Saint Patrick's Day, a vibrant commemoration of Irish culture and heritage. Additionally, the vernal equinox, marking the official start of spring, falls within March, symbolizing the renewal of life and the promise of warmer days ahead.

Mayor's Comments

The regular meeting of the **Corrales Village Council** was canceled last Tuesday, 2/25/2025, because of a one car accident that began at the corner of LaEntrada and Corrales Road and ended behind the Village Courthouse. The truck took out the internet connection and the power to the Council Chambers, so the meeting was **rescheduled for 3/4/2025** at 6:30 p.m.

Ron Curry, Corrales village administrator, and I visited our legislators on Monday in Santa Fe to talk about capital outlay and stress the needs of the village for project funding. Between the two (**Kathleen Cates and Cindy Nava**) who represent this area (Bernalillo, Corrales, Rio Rancho) they have about \$6 million to spread around for capital projects. Our priorities for requests this year were for fire suppression, road drainage and repair projects, and emergency response equipment and vehicles.

The Village is trying to form partnerships to deal with this **water shortage and drought,** so there may be a more consistent supply of water for agricultural use in the future. The water shortages will not improve given the changes occurring to the climate. More interest has been generated at more levels of government and individuals are coming together to produce proposals to mitigate the impacts on agriculture. The farmers in Corrales are **forming a coalition** to come up with plans to protect our food sources in the village. You don't have to be a farmer to be concerned or to join. You just have to care about our village and its future. A **membership meeting** will be held **Sunday, March 2, from 3 p.m. until 5 p.m.** at the Corrales Community Center. Having more voices and partners gives us strength to get things done.

It's time to renew your Corrales Historical Society Membership. There are various levels of membership available, from a \$25 annual individual

HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE

Having your **emergency plan and kit** can make all emergency situations easier. If you missed the community presentation on February 23 you can watch it on the **Village YouTube channel** by clicking on this link: <u>https://m.youtube.com/watch?v=EyhFpBp_WFo&feature=youtu.be</u>. What is a **community emergency**? A community emergency is an event that has the potential to impact more than one person or propert**y** in a dangerous or harmful way. Examples would be large fires, extreme flooding, and certain police activity. Items such as road closures, snowfall and short-term power or gas outages are **nuisances**, and while they do affect us, they are not going to lead to community-wide harm. Please remember that what is a nuisance to the community, such as a road closure from a traffic accident, is an emergency for the people involved in the accident and our first duty of emergency responders and staff is to help the individuals involved.

The way the Village would notify the pu**blic** of a community emergency such as a large fire or police activity with a potential to impact others would be through **CodeRed** and possibly the **Emergency Alert System** for fire and floods and other dangerous events. CodeRed alerts may be sent village-wide or just to a designated affected or potentially affected area. If you need assistance signing up, call the fire department 505-898-7501 or stop by the main fire station on Corrales Road. **Sign up for Code**

If something may be a long-term nuisance, we make notifications as possible that can impact a person's normal daily activities via the village social media, Facebook, Nextdoor, and less likely Instagram. There are times when roads are closed for short periods and notifications are not posted. There are power outages we do not always know about. Additionally, the village website may be bannered, having an information area popup when logging on to the website, for certain activities. Banners would be used for a long-term emergency event such as a large on-going fire or severe flood. For long-term community emergencies a **webpage** would be added to update people on where to find shelters, how to check in that you are safe but not at a shelter, what resources for assistance are available and other information about the emergency. We would also post on social media to direct you to the website. Please know during an emergency it will take time to set the pages up as stabilization of the community emergency is priority. Make sure you are using the information sent from the CodeRed system.

If you want to make sure you get social media updates, there are ways to make social media work better. On Facebook you can set the village page to favorites and this will help make sure the algorithm prioritizes the Village's posts. On Nextdoor, make sure your notifications settings under Public Agencies allows emails and push notifications. If you set it to allow emails, you will get an email from the public agency you follow when they post. If you do not follow the Village fire and police department on Nextdoor, add the accounts. Nextdoor has many settings under notifications to help you get the information you want and limit the information you do not want.
