Mayor's Comments

The old, deteriorating **Boy Scout Bridge** has been replaced courtesy of the ingenuity of our fire chief, **Anthony Martinez**. Next time you go to the Bosque, check it out. It is a few hundred feet north of where the old bridge was. That bridge was removed this week after the installation of the new bridge was completed.

The Village issued its first **door-to-door sales permit** this week to a pest control company located in Albuquerque. All door-to-door salespeople must have a current business license and door-to-door permit with the Village to conduct operations. All salespeople must wear a badge issued by the Village and have a copy of their current business license with them. They are also instructed to honor "No Solicitation" and "No Trespassing" signs on properties within the Village limits. If you would like to avoid door-to-door solicitation, make sure you have such a sign visible on the edge of your property. If an unlicensed vendor comes to your door, you can report the person to the Village Code Enforcement officer at srice@corrales-nm.org.

The plan for the **Arts and Cultural District** designation was **rejected** by the Village Council at the most recent meeting, 3/25/2025. Many in the Village participated in developing this plan under the guidance and direction of **Corrales MainStreet** funded by a **grant** from the NM State MainStreet. Unless it is brought back by the Council for reconsideration, it is defeated. A relatively small vocal group believed this would harm our community. The ACD Plan committee's work reflected the needs and desires of the community and residents, much like the Comprehensive Plan. It stressed the value of tradition, the history, arts, culture, and agriculture, which have created our unique community feel. The desire was to provide value and a greater quality of life for us and the entire community we are all proud to call home.

Funds are available to replace the heater and filter on the **swimming pool** at the Rec Center. The work should all be done by the opening day of the pool, 5/24/2025. I am certainly ready.

Speaking of the Rec Center, memberships are now available to use the **Rec Center facilities** (the pool is NOT included in the membership options). You have several choices available that include use of the old gym workout room, exercise classes, or use of the new gym for activities such as pickleball. Current hours for the gym are **6:30 AM – 6:30 PM**. These times are subject to change based on seasonal staffing, so make sure to check the website for current hours. meeting in person, and the recording will be posted to the Village YouTube channel the following week.

The **Kiwanis Egg Hunt** will be **4/19 at 10 AM**, the Saturday before Easter Sunday. We saw many coyotes, perhaps even Wile E. Coyote, and anticipate he will be after the Rabbit, so our police will be in attendance.

The **Village-wide clean-up day** is planned for **4/26/2025**. Mark your calendar. There will be more about this as we get closer to the date.

¡Viva Corrales! will also kick off on Saturday, 4/26 with **Corrales Historical Society Mudding Day** at the **Historic Old San Ysidro Church**, 966 Old Church Rd from **9 AM – 3 PM**. Join CHS and the community for a day of mud, sweat and cheers for the annual re-mudding of the Historic Old Church. Develop new skills, meet new people, connect with your community and expand your horizons.

On Sunday, 4/27, the **Grower's Market** opens the season from **9AM to 12 PM**. Our local growers will begin their regular season, along with Sandoval County's Master Gardeners, who will be selling plant starts for your garden! The Acequia blessing will be held on the ditch behind the soccer field at 9:30 AM. Rides, Strides and Giddyup will give a number of demonstrations to safely enjoy our walking and riding paths, and what to do if you encounter horses, bikes and other pedestrians along the way. CHAMP (Corrales Horse and Mule People) will be hosting equestrian activities and education at Top Form Arena. Events will take place at the Corrales Rec Center and Top Form Arena alongside the New Gym from **9 AM to 5 PM**.

The **Corralitos 4-H Club** just completed a 3,500-cu. ft. R**C hot air balloon**. The Corralitos members designed and built the balloon, applying skills in sewing, woodworking, STEM and teamwork. The group unveiled their balloon at a small gathering at the Rec Center on March 26. 4-H is a national youth development program that builds confidence, responsibility, and problem-solving through hands-on learning in agriculture, STEM, leadership, and civic engagement. By tackling real-world projects with mentorship and perseverance, 4-H members grow into well-rounded individuals ready for future success. Our local 4-H club assists with the Village's clean up days in the spring and fall, and last year planted alfalfa on the agricultural easement on the Gonzales property north of the library. HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE

The warm weather means more outdoor activity. It also means you need to increase your fluid intake to prevent dehydration. Keep a water bottle with you while outside and make sure you are drinking. Watch for symptoms of heat related illness such as dizziness, nausea, headache, rapid heartbeat and high body temperature. If you have any of these symptoms, get out of the heat, cool off with a shower or cool compress and increase fluid intake. If severe symptoms call 911. Wearing light colored clothing, a hat, pacing yourself and taking breaks in the shade can also help prevent heat illness. While outside wear sunscreen at least SPF 30 and reapply every two hours or more if sweating or swimming. Don't forget your sunglasses.
