



Mayor's Comments

June 27, 2025

On June 21 a new Miss New Mexico and Miss New Mexico's Teen were crowned. The competition took place at the Flickinger Center for Performing Arts in Alamogordo, NM. Our new Miss New Mexico is **Miss Corrales**Madyson Kettler.

Madyson Kettler is a Corrales resident and will be a graduate in December 2025 at The University of New Mexico. After physical therapy school she will serve the geriatric population. Madyson is a professional ballet dancer with the New Mexico Ballet Company and is also an instructor. Her platform centers around advocacy, empowering seniors to stay active, and to inspire generations to stand by their sides.

Madyson will represent New Mexico at the Miss America Competition Sept 2-7 in Orlando, Fla. We wish her the best of luck in the competition.

On July 4, 1776, the Continental Congress adopted the **Declaration of Independence**, proclaiming the thirteen American colonies' severance from British rule. This document, primarily authored by Thomas Jefferson, articulated the colonies' reasons for seeking independence and formally declared their status as free and independent states. The Declaration also established the foundational principles of the United States, including equality, unalienable rights, and the right to revolution. Thus, we became a free democracy. In response to a question some years later, as to whether we had a republic or a monarchy, Ben Franklin said, "A republic, if you can keep it." On that day we celebrate our republic that has now existed almost 250 years. This week, the village will honor that history by recognizing the 4th of July with a parade and celebrations. The parade will begin at 10 a.m. and will run along Corrales Road from Wagner Farms to the Rec Center. If you would like to participate in the parade, you can register for free at the Parks and Recreation page on the village website Start planning now for this fun Corrales tradition.

At the June 24 council meeting, a presentation was given by the Stantec Engineering Firm who did the preliminary engineering report for a possible **village-wide sewer system**. The administration was able to get a grant to determine if there was a potential problem with ground water contamination, how to avoid that, and also to develop alternatives for citizens whose septic systems fail. The village is making good progress with the **fire suppression system**. It couldn't happen at a better time as evidenced by the fires that have wreaked havoc in our region over the last few years. We need to remain alert and observant to prevent fires and catch them early if they occur.

The next **local elections** are going to be in **November**. The election for mayor and councilors for districts 1, 3, and 4 will be held in November of 2025. Those individuals who have an interest in running for office are invited to attend the council meetings which I think are better in person, although ZOOM is available. There will only be one day to sign up for your name to appear on the ballot, which will be August 26 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Sandoval County clerk's office.

A public meeting is planned for July 9 to get input regarding the **Corrales Interior Drain Plan**. It will be held in the council chambers at 5:30 p.m. with ZOOM availability so you can dial in. HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE

Last weekend there was a fire in the bosque on the east side of the Rio Grande just north of Alameda Blvd. **Corrales Firefighters** assisted with the blaze and were on patrol in the Village to ensure the fire didn't spread to the Corralesside of the river. So far, the Village has been lucky in avoiding a large-scale fire. However, residents should make sure they are prepared in case of an event that requires evacuation from the Village.

GET READY:

Being "Ready" for wildfire starts with maintaining an **adequate defensible space** around your home. Clear dry brush and vegetation away from the

outside of your home starting in the 5-foot zone and working your way out to the 100–200-foot zone. Without this buffer, the fire will quickly spread through surrounding vegetation to your home. Consider fire resistant landscaping and hardening your home with fire-resistant building materials. Flying embers from a wildfire can destroy homes up to a mile away.

GET SET:

Prepare yourself and your home for the possibility of evacuation before wildfire arrives. Follow these simple steps to get "Set":

- Create a Wildfire Action Plan that includes evacuation planning for your home, family and pets.
- Assemble an Emergency Supply Kit for each person in your household.
- Fill out a **Family Communication Plan** that includes important evacuation and contact information.
- **Stay informed** by following local media, local fire alerts, and county emergency notifications.

GO!

If there is an active wildfire in your area, be prepared before it's time to Go! If time allows, review your **Wildfire Action Plan** and complete the Pre-Evacuation Preparation Steps in the RSG guide. Load your emergency supply kit and evacuation bags (including pet kits) into your vehicle and park facing the road for a quick exit. You don't need to wait for an evacuation order. If you feel threatened, then evacuate early. When an evacuation order is issued, there is no time to waste. Ensure your bags and kit are in your vehicle, locate and load your pets, wear clothing that will protect you against heat and flying embers, and **GO!**

Make sure you are registered for **CODE RED** alerts to get specific instructions in the event of an emergency. Visit https://public.coderedweb.com/CNE/en-US/BFB7CC4C6C0A to register or update your information.
