October's name derives from the Latin word "octo," meaning "eight," because it was the eighth month in the original Roman calendar. The addition of January and February bumped it back two spots to the tenth month, but the name remained.

Hereabouts, the Balloon Fiesta draws hundreds of thousands of visitors to the area and generates an almost frantic level of activity during its nine-day run. In 2024 nearly 840,000 people visited the area.

Halloween ushers out the month, and it has become bigger and bigger. Nationally, from 2019 to 2024, total spending on Halloween decorations increased by 42%, from \$2.6 billion to \$3.8 billion. Total spending on the holiday grew by 32% during the same time period.

Its menu is wide ranging, including appetizers, salads, soups, sandwiches, pasta, and other main course dishes. There are 20 ales and lagers in tap, and over 70 varieties of bottled beer. Wine is served by glass or bottle, and O'Hare's is a former multiple winner of the People's Choice award for best cocktail in Rio Rancho.



Mayor's Comments

September 26, 2025

Jason Casuga, CEO/chief engineer for the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District, and Felix Chaves, governor of Sandia Pueblo, signed the agreement that will allow the work on the **Corrales Siphon** to proceed. The agreement was signed at the Village of Corrales Council Chambers on Sept. 25 at a special meeting. The MRGCD recognized the siphon had not received proper permits for right of way from the Pueblo, which meant the district had been trespassing on Pueblo lands for nearly 100 years. This agreement was the result of negotiations and hard work on the part of both

the MRGCD and the Pueblo of Sandia, and Corrales farmers were happy to hear work should likely begin on the siphon in January of 2026.

From **Ron Curry**, Corrales village administrator:

As you know, the village administration has been working with a team of experts to assist with the purchase of **water rights** for the village. This process has required an exhaustive inventory of the village's current wells, water rights, and water usage, to ensure the information on file with the Office of the State Engineer is up to date. Once we know everything is correct, the team will begin preparing all the paperwork necessary to complete the transfer of the water rights we are looking to purchase. For that transfer, the state engineer requires a 40-year water plan that shows how the Village is currently using its water rights and what its anticipated future needs will be. The plan is intended to benefit all Corraleños, including farming and other uses that make the village unique, while faced with continuing drought and related challenges in water availability.

We will have a closed executive session at the next council meeting on Oct,14, with the members of this water team to answer specific questions from the council about the work they are doing on behalf of the Village.

Now, from the **mayor**:

The Bureau of Reclamation has started their project in the bosque. There will be much **clearing of non-native vegetation** and reinforcement and stabilization of the riverbanks. For those of us unaccustomed to this scope of work it may appear quite devastating. They will continue their work until April 15, 2026, and then take a break during nesting season. They will resume the project in August of 2026. It's **election season**, so go to the village website homepage and **click** on the section labeled "elections." The information you need should be there. Elections are being held on **Nov 4**, although early voting will be available. Early voting starts **Oct. 18** at the Corrales Community Center from 10 a.m. until 7 p.m. The site will be open through Nov. 1 on Mondays through Saturdays. Be sure to vote. It is our responsibility as citizens to be informed and to vote.

The **Corrales Growers' Market** will be open Sundays until Nov. 2 and Wednesdays until Oct. 15 from 9 a.m. until noon. There will be special holiday and winter markets. They are posted on the village website calendar.

The **Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta** will start **Oct. 4** and run until **Oct. 12**. Don't forget to stop by the administration office to pick up the "X" s to mark landing spots if you have space on your property. The balloonists respect private property so, if you don't mark it, they will try not to land there. Enjoy the fiesta.

HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE

Although **covid and flu** rates are steady at **relatively low** numbers, we are coming up on the time of year when people will be spending more time indoors, and more time around other people at events and gatherings, such as Halloween parties.
